- 3. Generator use should be with consideration for others in camp and a recommended quiet time from 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM needs to be observed.
- 4. By operating your machine in a safe responsible manner, waiting at intersections and corners, you can insure that fellow riders will not be left behind and everyone will have an enjoyable ride.

PAST RIDES

Almo Campout and Raft River Mountain Club Ride By Kent Oliver, MVATV Riders Ride Coordinator Ride Leader: Jerry Kriegh July 11-13

What comes to mind when you hear of a campout and ride in the middle of the desert in mid-July, HEAT and DUST, right? Well, let me tell you how very wrong that was. This last winter I approached Jerry Kriegh and asked him what he thought about a club ride in the Raft River Mountains in Northern Utah. He accepted the challenge, began planning the trip, and asked if we might do it as a club campout and include a ride through the City of Rocks National Preserve. Given distance to the area, I thought this to be a very good idea and an opportunity for members to get away for the weekend.

May arrived and then June, but the mountains still had too much snow in the high country. Near the middle of June, it appeared the snow had melted enough for a preride. The pre-ride went well except for the 15-inch Quaking Aspen tree that decided to fall across a narrow stretch of trail near a creek crossing. Due to previously planned excursions in June and Independence Day holiday in July, we had to schedule the campout and ride for July 12 and 13.

And now, the rest of the story to which you have been waiting for. I checked the weather reports every day the week before the ride and said the weatherman was having a hard time predicting the temperatures for the weekend. On Friday, the predicted high for Almo was 88 degrees. Then the flash flood warning came for Friday afternoon and evening. I knew Jerry had gone to Almo to set up camp and reserve sites for club members. I wondered if the storm was as intense as they predicted it.

It is Saturday morning; a weekend morning that most people take advantage of to sleep in. However, for me it was waking to my alarm at 6 a.m. I dressed and packed my lunch and water for the days riding. At 7 a.m., I was on the road heading to Almo, wondering how the previous day's storm might have affected our ride. After quick drive thru at McDonalds, I was on my way. I arrived at the campground at approximately 8:45. Glad the roads from Declo to Almo were in great shape. Aaron Larson and his riding partner had arrived just ahead of me. We spoke with Jerry, the only club camper there and he said it rained hard and was windy.

It is 9:30 a.m. and the temperature 71 degrees when five ATVs and a Razr, seven riders total, departed for the ride. Jerry led us across the desert, passing historical markers showing the location of the California Trail, and into Utah. We entered the Sawtooth National Forest Raft River Mountains by way of an old settlement of Yost. Still full of activity with working ranches and farms, some old structures are still visible. As we started our climb out of Yost the effects of Friday's heavy rain was visible. There was water washed ruts in the road but nothing that stopped us or needed special attention. In fact, the only special attention was a flat tire that Aaron Larson's Roadside Tire Service repaired.

PAST RIDES.....Almo Ride continued

At 11:30 a.m., we stopped for lunch because we would be climbing above the pines. We ate our lunch at 8930 feet in elevation overlooking a large meadow with tall green grass and a flowing creek down the middle. Our views of the mountains in southern Idaho and the Raft River Valley were awesome. To this point, we had traveled among the juniper trees and high valley meadows. Now we will start our trek through the pine trees.

After our lunch break, we continued to climb to the ridgeline where the Park Valley area of Northern Utah came into view. According to the George Creek Snotel weather station nearby it showed the temperature at 55 degrees. At this point, we began our westward trek on an old two-track road then eventually turned into an exciting ATV trail. As we road we had the pleasure of views that made you feel on top of the world. Well, let's face it, at nearly 9800 feet elevation you are kind of on top of the world. The trail proved to be easy riding with a few rocky places. As we started our decent back into the valley, we had to negotiate rocky terrain, switchbacks, and a moderate side hill. Jerry's ride rating of 3 to 4 was right on the mark. As we continued down, we returned to the pines and junipers. We could also start to feel the temperature rising. Eventually we got back onto old two track roads and nice gravel roads. The ride was a complete loop, never crossing or riding on the same route section twice. We ended our trek at 3:00 P.M. with a temperature near 90 degrees. This was well worth my time and I will schedule it again, maybe this fall when the colors begin to change.

JARBIDGE HISTORICAL TOUR

June 28, 2014

On June 28TH members of the MVATVR joined about 100 other folks at the Three Creek Store for the beginning of the Jarbidge historical tour. Gus Brackett, local rancher, writer and member of the Owyhee County Historical Society treated us to insights of local history, some folklore, some myths and much history as we started the tour at the old Three Creek Store. From there we caravanned to Murpyhy's Hot Springs, onto the site of the old Crippen Grade and then in to Jarbidge. Many of us unloaded our ATV's at the top of the grade and rode our machines into Jarbidge. After lunch in Jarbidge, Stan Mai led a group of ATV'S through the old town of Pavlik and up the mountain to the Bluster Mine. We then returned to Jarbidge and many of us took the old trail from Jarbidge across the island to Murphy's with stops at the old Butcher Stop, and remains of the freighters stop. An old fashioned wiener roast over an open fire was the final stop of an exciting and informative day. Many thanks to Gus Brackett for inviting our group to participate.

The Forest Service roads in this area provide for GREAT riding and beautiful scenery. What would you think of a 38 mile ride over well maintained winding gravel roads that follow the South Fork of the Boise River? Bring your fishing poles, camera, brats, s'mores, potato salad and plenty of gas. Ride level of 1+/2 for the first half of the Saturday ride. Some riders may want to return to camp at this point as the remainder of the trail will transition into a ride level 3+. The Sunday ride will be a continuous level of 2 with the option of continuing up to the Forest Service Lookout at Trinity Mtn. (ride level 3) toward the tail end of the ride.

- The Saturday and Sunday rides will be a round trip of "**90 miles**" each. <u>Bring extra gas</u> and plenty of food and drinks. Due to the length of the ride, we will need to travel at the posted speed limit of 35 mph on some portions of the Forest Service roads.
- We will need to leave the primary campsite "promptly" at 9 am.
- The <u>primary campsite</u> is located 7 miles north of Pine (no fees or services) on Forest Service Road o61Z (left turn off the highway). Campsites can not be reserved. You will need to cross a shallow creek to access the camping area. The GPS location is: N43 34.228 W115 16.235
- If the primary campsite is full, a <u>secondary site</u> (no fees, however bathroom services are available) is located 4.2 miles east of Featherville. The GPS location is: N43 37.134 W115 11.128

SAWTOOTH NATIONAL FOREST REMINDS THE PUBLIC THAT LEAVING CAMPFIRES UNATTENDED CAN RESULT IN A CITATION

TWIN FALLS, ID. . . . As fire season begins to heat up the Sawtooth National Forest is seeing an increase in campfires being left unattended. In addition we are seeing an increase in campfires in dispersed camping areas being left and not extinguished.



On the Minidoka Ranger District 45 abandoned campfires have been found this season, 21 campfires just over the 4th of July weekend.

This can and will result in a citation, "36CFR 261.5(d) leaving your campfire without completely extinguishing it" carries a \$200.00 fine. The public must remember that leaving a campfire unattended while taking a nap, fishing the creek, taking a hike can result in a wildfire that could cost them millions of dollars.



TRAIL DIFFICULTY GUIDE

Level 1, Beginner:

Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2, Advanced Beginner:

Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3, Intermediate:

Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

Level 4, Advanced Intermediate:

Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center on obstacles. Four-wheel drive highly recommended.

Level 5, Expert:

Very rocky, steep, off camber, high water crossings, large ruts. Large obstacles in trails, narrow with big drop offs. Four-wheel drive required, may need winch.
