- 2. Idaho State Law states that being under the influence and/or consuming alcohol or illegal drugs while operating an OHV is illegal and therefor will not be tolerated by MVATVR, Inc.
- 3. Generator use should be with consideration for others in camp and a recommended quiet time from 10:00 PM to 6:00 AM needs to be observed.
- 4. By operating your machine in a safe responsible manner, waiting at intersections and corners, you can insure that fellow riders will not be left behind and everyone will have an enjoyable ride.
- 5. Being a responsible member means, abiding by state motorized laws and obeying regulations for the area you are riding in, not disturbing wildlife, respecting the land and any private property that is crossed and closing any gates you open.

PAST RIDES

Ellen D Mountain/Jackpot Ride October 22 Stan Mai

On October 22, seventeen ATVs and UTVs met at Club 93 in Jackpot and headed south into the desert in search of adventure and the summit of Ellen D mountain. As we unloaded our machines about 8 miles south of Jackpot glimmering in the sun to the south was a high peak with towers on top and covered with snow. We headed in that direction following a not so straight path of two track roads that follow the terrain up, down, back and forth. Along the way we surprised a very nice buck deer that did not seem too concerned about us as he slowly trotted away. As we got closer to Ellen D it became more apparent that snow would play a part in reaching the summit. When we made the turn to head to the top on the gravel road, we could immediately tell that wind combined with snow had left drifts exceeding a foot across the road. The leader with foot on the floor and passenger with a death grip plowed into the first drift only to come to a sudden stop. Undaunted he backed hit again with the same result. But, as they say the third time was a charm and we made it through the first drift. This procedure was repeated several more times as we continued our assault on the summit. Just as pioneers of past days we persevered and were successful in conquering Ellen D Mountain.

Oh, it was worth it. We were greeted with sunshine very little wind and a spectacular 360 degree view of northern Nevada. After spending some time at the top of the mountain we headed down a different route toward lunch. We stopped in a low spot along a wash, got out our supply of wood, got a fire going and everyone enjoyed cooked or in some cases, burnt over the fire hot dogs. We then headed south to Natural Arch where we made a short stop. We then passed some very rugged canyons know as the badlands as we headed along Salmon Falls Creek toward the old mining town of Contact. We traveled through the old mining area above Contact and just below Ellen D. Mountain. We then began the last leg of our adventure as we turned north towards the vehicles. The leader being concerned that maybe some folks were getting bored arranged for a small herd of Elk including two bulls to cross through our group with some folks getting an up close and personal view of one bull. Shortly after the elk encounter Marvin Barnes, being kind of a tech guy, decided to conduct an experiment. Marvin wanted to see whether the required angle of approach into a dip could be altered by appropriate speed, weight of passenger, degree of steering input and superior driving technique. It has been determined that further study is needed for this experiment to reach a positive conclusion. We then traveled north reaching the vehicles. The leader would like to thank all those who attended. Everyone seemed to have a great time. It was great to see some of our newer members join us.

PAST RIDES

Year End 100 Ride October 1

The goal is for the YE 100 to take place every year on the first Saturday of October. As the time grew closer for the third Annual YE100 ride Mother Nature began flirting with the weather. Rains, wind, and cool temperatures teased the weather reports for weeks. With bewildering emotions and tasked with making yet another ride decision, the ride coordinator decided the ride must go on. The ride leader stomped his foot and said, "If the mail can be delivered in stormy weather then so can the MVATV Riders YE 100 go on."

On Saturday, October 1, 2016, the weather prediction was for 50 to 60 degrees and possible rain showers for the riding area. As the group assembled at the staging area near Porcupine Springs Campground, the sun began to peek from behind the clouds. The day was already looking better than expected. Eighteen guests and members of the MVATVR met for a safety briefing. Randy and Jeanette Graham were the only riders with a machine over 50 inches and true to the ride leaders word they were given a map showing bypass routes around the 50" and less trails and rally points. In addition, there were six Razrs with ten riders and five ATVs with six riders.

At 9:00 AM, after the briefing, the Grahams took off on the first bypass route. The remaining machines headed down the Little Fork Trail and eventually onto the Third Fork Trail. As we approached the next turn onto Martindale Canyon Trail, it was a welcomed relief to see our first trail hazard in great shape. This trail hazard is close to the creek and historically sluffs off during rainstorms and as grazing animals pass through causing an off-camber situation to maneuver. However, in June of this year members of our club took to the trail and did a reverse camber construction to it. The result, after the days of rain and grazing animals had passed through, the trail was still safe for riders to pass through.

We then started making our way up Martindale Canyon Trail. About half way, we found the trail blocked by a fallen tree and no route around. This required us to get out the saws and go to work clearing the way. Afterwards we continued to the trailhead at the 500 road where we met up with the Grahams.

After a short break, we took off riding towards the northeast. We rode various roads passing Wrigley Corrals, Fred's Mound, and Coal Pits. We continued north on Dry Creek Road then took a right turn and looped around Indian Springs (not the same as south of Kimberly) and over to Basin Patch Springs area. After a short ride on Buckhorn Road, we pulled off and had a great lunch.

After Lunch, we made the loop around Stump Hollow and then started our decent down Medley Creek and past Buckhorn Butte. This took us off the forest service lands and onto BLM lands. We experienced some showers along this leg of the ride. As we neared the northern boundary of public lands, we cut across to the Cold Springs Basin area. From here, we rode east along the fence bordering Funk's feedlot to the Mountain Springs drainage where we turned south.

PAST RIDES YE 100 Ride report by Kent Oliver continued......

We experienced deep washes and steep climbs as we rode the trails and roads in this area. After making a steep climb, we stopped on a plateau where we had a good view of the Murtaugh area. Adverse weather conditions obscured or views of the Magic Valley and Northern Mountains.

We then continued our trek south through the Mountain Meadow creek area heading for the Buckhorn Road. This trek proved once again how preplanning and pre-riding still never proves flawless. The growth of grasses hid the road and the ride leader had to rely on his previous pre-ride track to find the route. After reaching Buckhorn Road, the group descended ounce again to the valley floor. At junction of Buckhorn Road and Robbers Gulch, we took a break.

Here the second bypass route for the Grahams took place. They would travel out to Mountain Road heading towards Oakley then turned up Big Cedar Road, travel up to the Buckhorn Road, and join up with the group at the top of Cave Canyon Trail. During their trip up Big Cedar Road, the Grahams had to navigate a series of rock slides that blocked the road to regular motor vehicles but their Maverick...

The rest of the group headed up Robbers Gulch. This trail used to be a road but the wildland fires in the last few years coupled with the heavy rains since has left this route accessible by 50 inch or less. Areas along the route would prove extremely difficult for any wider machines. After topping out of Robbers Gulch, we cut through to the top of Franks Canyon. We then road part way down Big Cedar Road and cut over to Mud Springs then up the top end of Cave Canyon. Along the way, a few riders missed the cone indicating a turn off Big Cedar Road and luck for us they met with the Grahams who got them back on track.

After all riders were grouped back up we rode past Terrell's Cabin and through Billy's Hole. In addition, we encountered more trees to clear from the road. This took longer to complete, as we had to open the entire road width. We then road past Sawmill Creek, through Bear Flat Creek area, Ecklund Creek and Cabin Springs Creek, finally arriving at Bostetter Campground for our final break of the day. After our break, we continued southbound towards Porcupine Springs Campground. A short distance from Bostetter Campground the group got to see a bull, cow, and calf moose grazing a short distance from the road. We rode on into Trapper Creek and turned up Grouse Springs road. Here is where the Grahams left the group and finished their final leg of the trip. I believe they rode 108 miles that day.

The rest of group rode down Telephone Canyon then took the 920 trail. At the 920 and 921 junction, part of the group left the ride and rode to Porcupine Springs Campground. The last remaining diehards wandered through the various routes in the FS Trail System. The riders were treated by seeing a small heard of deer who had stopped to see what was going on. The group then joined the 500 road near Blind Creek and rode past FS flats and on the backside of Porcupine Springs.

Again we were treated to seeing another bull, cow, and calf moose on a hillside in the Quaking Aspen trees. We arrived at Porcupine Springs Campground just after sunset and had ridden approximately 98 miles.



From your Public Lands Director

The fun part of having a club like MVATVR is club meetings, rides, social interaction, making new friends, having new places to ride. All these things are great and is the reason many folks decide to join a local OHV club. But, and this is a big but if you have no place to ride none of the other things matter. This is why the public lands side of our club is important. It is boring to most folks and they really do not want to hear about it. This month I wanted to bring you up to date on what we are currently doing to keep our riding areas open.

- North Rim Canyon Park: It appears the park may finally be going forward. We are working with the Jerome County Commissioners, the BLM and Idaho department of lands to make this park a true multiple use park where OHV use will be allowed and welcomed throughout the park.
- Idaho Department of Lands. We will be meeting with the management of the Idaho Department of Lands regarding the \$1.00 of our sticker money that goes to IDL for OHV improvements. We are also working to insure that IDL leases require that all exiting roads and trails stay open to motorized use.
- Sawtooth National Recreation Area. I met with representatives of the SNRA in regards to there
 proposed Travel Management plan for the Wood River Valley, We are very concerned that the
 SNRA's management plan is more concerned with preservation than maintaining and improving
 access for motorized travel.
- Manti LaSalle National Forest in Utah will be revising there Forest Plan and we will be involved with this process. This area is home to some fantastic ATV/ UTV riding
- Salmon Challis National Forest will soon be starting on their Forest Plan revision and we have notified them that we want to be involved in the process.
- We are working with Shoshone Field Office of the BLM on maintaining and improving access to their land north of Highway 20. There is a lot of private land in this area and we would like to see the BLM become more proactive in acquiring easements for motorized travel across this land.
- Jarbidge Area of BLM. In the near future Travel Management planning will be starting in this area. This is in our backyard and heavily used by our members.
- Minidoka Ranger District of Sawtooth National Forest. Again a very popular area for our members.
 We are working to get some proposed trails on the ground and usable, we also are working to make improvements to existing trails.
- Fairfield Ranger District. Many of you helped with the Bridge project last summer. I am happy to report the bridge is now fully completed and ready for use. Thanks to Steve Frost, Recreation planner for working to get this project completed. We have other projects in the works that hopefully will result in some improved access in the very near future.

This is just a snapshot of last month's activities. It is a constant battle to keep our public lands open for our use. This is why it is so vital that our club remains large enough to have a voice in Public Land management decisions.

TRAIL DIFFICULTY GUIDE

Level 1, Beginner:

Gravel or dirt surfaces that are relatively flat and wide. Generally wide enough for an ATV to pass a full-sized vehicle. May be dusty but are relatively smooth with no rocks or roots protruding more than three inches above the surface. Ride distance will be short, speeds very slow.

Level 2, Advanced Beginner:

Mild ups and downs, some narrow, mild rock, mostly roads and jeep trails, minor off camber. Two-wheel drive ok.

Level 3, Intermediate:

Loose gravel, sandy, rocky or rutty surface. May have short sections that are narrow. Can have blind turns, switchbacks, steep or roller coaster grades, some off-camber side hills, minor drop-offs, ruts and frequent changes in riding surfaces. Occasional obstacles may strike the frame. Four-wheel drive may be needed depending on conditions. Pace of ride will be a little faster, distances and length of ride will be longer.

Level 4, Advanced Intermediate:

Rocky surfaces, sharp turns, switchbacks, steep grades, narrow passages, low overhangs, ledges and large rocks. Can be slippery and muddy when wet. May have tree stumps, limbs or other debris. Machines with low ground clearance may strike or high center on obstacles. Four-wheel drive highly recommended.

Level 5, Expert:

Very rocky, steep, off camber, high water crossings, large ruts. Large obstacles in trails, narrow with big drop offs. Four-wheel drive required, may need winch.
